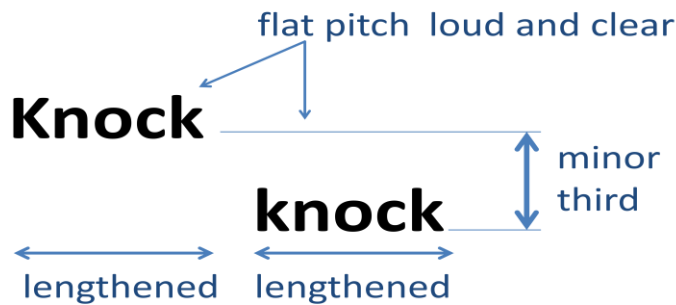


# The Minor Third Pattern - Summary Sheet

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## Prosodic Properties

1. A sharp pitch drop,
2. Between two syllables,
3. Each syllable flat in pitch,
4. Each syllable loud, clear, and lengthened,
5. Not too ending too low in pitch.

## General Meaning

- Indicate to the interlocutor that he should pay attention, and respond right away

## Context of use

- When there is a social norm that licenses you to invoke a specific response

## Common use scenarios

- In games, to initiate a response sequence (*knock-knock, nyah-nyah ...*)
- In greetings and partings, to cue a symmetric response (*hello, bye-bye ...*)
- When you have the turn, to cue the other person to wait while you do something (*hold on, just a sec....*)
- When someone else is speaking, to make them stop (*excuse me ...*)
- When you need to catch someone's attention (*hey there, over here, excuse me, Johnny ...*)
- When you need someone to move a little so you can pass (*excuse me ...*)
- *etc.*
